NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS FOR WRITERS

A Penguin Random House *Blast from the Past*. Several years ago, Random House came out with eight recommended resolutions for writers. Following are the general ideas, lovingly modified with my own spin on them ©.

- 1. **Set a realistic writing goal for 2026**. Consider calling a writing friend to share in a mutual goal-setting session. Write down your resolution and hold yourself accountable.
- 2. **Meet other authors**. This might mean getting out to author talks, participating in local and regional conferences, or connecting on social media. Writing groups are a great way to connect with others who share your stresses, excitement, and necessary diligence. To learn more tips and tricks of the trade, seek out writing retreats, author panels, and bookstore discussions.
- 3. **Set a 2026 reading goal.** Reading is the key to good writing. Keep on top of current trends, hone your own writing skills, and share your passion for the written word by joining a book club. You can keep track of your goals and share recommendations on Goodreads.
- 4. **Try something new.** Alter your writing time, try a new style or genre, outline (if you usually don't) or don't (if you usually do). The more tips and tools you have at your disposal, the smoother your writing process will go.
- 5. **Improve your social media skills.** This is a way to build your audience while learning from others along the way. Set goals here, too, and make a point of reciprocating the follow.
- 6. **Write badly.** Don't be afraid of the ugly first draft. It is a necessary evil! There will be plenty of time to revise later. First, breathe life into the words and let them live on the page. Take your time with those improvements. You can't edit a blank page, so keep moving forward, and learn to feel comfortable with the process.

- 7. **Schedule time for writing and revision.** Consider setting a writing calendar to notch out those precious sessions. Perhaps writing can be the first or last thing you do every day. Building a routine will help you generate more work. Once you've established a schedule, protect it. Carry a notebook and pen, text yourself passages while driving, and, if you need to, don't hesitate to call a (writer) friend to capture a concept.
- 8. **Refill your reserves.** Take time to replenish. Take a long walk, or a long bath. Read a great article. Unplug from social media. Climb that mountain. Your work will be waiting for you when you return, and your brain will appreciate the break.

All entries will be considered for publication with a \$20 entry fee. More than one manuscript may be entered. Before you submit, please remove your name and any other identifying information from your manuscript. Simultaneous submissions are okay, as long as you contact Swamp-Pink should the work be accepted elsewhere.

From <u>Authors Publish</u> comes the following early 2026

recommendations for submissions.

<u>Vine Leaves Press</u> is an international press with staff in the United States, Germany, Greece, England, and beyond. They were founded in 2011 as a literary journal and started publishing vignette collections in 2014. Vine Leaves Press publish books in a variety of genres including memoirs, coming of age, literary and multi-genre novels, poetry and short story collections, and reference books. They are open to submissions from December 1st 2025, and close on January 31st, 2026.

<u>Hohm Press</u> is a small print publisher based out of Arizona, Hohm has been around for many years. They are a respected press that has published a number of well-known authors. They generally focus on health and wellness. They are not interested in fiction or short story collections.

<u>becker&mayer! kids</u> is often abbreviated as b&m!. This is an imprint of <u>The Quarto Publishing Group</u> that focuses on publishing children's books that focus on portraying varying cultures, races, and abilities. They say this about the imprint, "We believe authenticity is even more important than just visibility. When people read about their own culture, it is often the nuances of the experience that are relatable. Our inspiring children's list brings representation and positivity to the reading landscape of young readers everywhere." They publish fiction and nonfiction for children.

<u>Tuttle Publishing</u> was originally founded in 1832 in Vermont. This makes it one of the oldest American publishers still in operation. In 1948, the company established a publishing outpost in Japan, and since then they have become much more focused on producing English-language books about the arts, languages and cultures of Asia. In fact currently Tuttle Publishing is only open to unsolicited submissions of work on "Asia-related topics". This includes Asian languages, cuisines, martial arts, arts and crafts, Eastern philosophies, etc. Do not submit any work outside of those topics to them. They are not interested in any fiction submissions.

<u>Eclipse</u> is the dark romance focused imprint of Entwined Publishing, which we have reviewed <u>here</u>. This is how they describe the imprint "Eclipse delves into the shadowy realms of dark romance, where love and danger intertwine. We are interested in submissions featuring dark billionaires, mafia kings, biker gangs, and anti-heroes who blur the lines between right and

wrong. Your stories should evoke intense emotions, explore forbidden desires, and offer complex, multi-dimensional characters that captivate and challenge readers."

<u>Headpress</u> was established in 1991 although the publishing arm wasn't active till 1992, according to their <u>FAQ</u>. Headpress focuses on publishing nonfiction. The subject matter they publish varies widely. They say "When Headpress first started, much of this was considered the counterculture. Now it is pop culture." They publish work on cult film, strange music, pulp literature, fanzines, conspiracy theories, sex and gender, occult and folklore, true crime, etc. It is still run by one of the three founders, David Kerekes.

Bookouture is a digital publisher that was purchased in 2017 by Hachette. Bookouture was extremely successful in their own right. They started out in the UK but they have outposts in a number of countries now. They focus on publishing commercial fiction. They primarily publish women's fiction, romance, thrillers, and chick lit.

Deep Hearts Jr. is an imprint of Deep Desires
Press, is launching a new sub-imprint called Deep
Hearts Jr. Deep Hearts Jr. will focus on publishing
middle grade (or MG) books for readers between the
ages of 8-12. They will be focusing mostly on
publishing LGBTQ+ middle grade fiction, in all
genres and sub-genres. The other imprints of the
same publisher all focus more on romance. The
focus on romance is not necessary for readers of this
age. The publishers stress that. "The queer element



of a Deep Hearts Jr. book should be present in the main character's immediate life, which could be an identity they are coming to terms with, they may be in a queer family, or there may be other opportunities for queerness in the character's life. (Having queer friends is too "distant"; queerness must be immediately present in the character's life.) Some themes we enjoy are self-empowerment, self-acceptance, or other related messages."

<u>Bloomsbury Publishing</u> was founded in 1986 in Britain and has since expanded with offices in a number of other countries. They are very established with excellent distribution. They publish a wide range of fiction and nonfiction but are only open to submissions for their academic imprint. For this imprint they accept textbook and academic proposal forms, including proposal forms for play anthologies and collections, and series proposals.

<u>Hurst</u> is a UK-based independent publisher that was founded in 1969. They only publish nonfiction and the core of their list focuses on "African Studies, Islamic & Middle Eastern



Studies, South Asian Studies, History, War & Conflict, and International Relations." Nonfiction work outside of those areas of study are not a good fit for them.

You can spend more time with their catalogue <u>here</u>. It is very easy to get a feel for what they publish, and what they do not.

REMINDER: 2025-2026 MEETING & SPEAKER SCHEDULE

January 17 at the Peterborough Library: Betsy Small. Revisiting journals and photos from



her Peace Corps days between 1984 and 1987 inspired Betsy Small's memoir *Before Before: A Story of Discovery and Loss in Sierra Leone*. In 1988, Small worked for the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C. and subsequently traveled to Africa to support a farming cooperative in Ghana. During her visit, Small hoped to visit with dear friends in Sierra Leone. Instead, the government of Ghana mistakenly accused her of belonging to a subversive group, which led to her arrest, detention, and deportation. Kirkus Reviews

called Small's *Before Before* "A powerful commentary and memoir that challenge Western narratives of Sierra Leone."

February 21 at the Peterborough Library: Sebastian Lockwood. Storyteller and podcaster Sebastian Lockwood tells the great epics: Gilgamesh, Odysseus, Caesar, Beowulf and Monkey. His studies in Classics and Anthropology at Boston University and Cambridge University in the UK laid the foundation for bringing these great tales into performance. Lockwood's

performances are designed to take complex texts and make them accessible and exciting for audiences from 5 to 95. Lockwood has tutored and taught classes in higher education for 25 years. Lockwood launched two storytelling podcasts in 2022: Blowing Up Stumps- tales from New and Old England (with Maine storyteller Matt Gile), and Monkey- the Journey to the West. He now concentrates on performance, podcasting, workshops, and audiobook narration. Lockwood lives under Crotched Mountain in a 1792 house with his wife, jazz singer and LUX Lifestyle founder, Nanette Perrotte.



March 21 at the Peterborough Library: Ken Sheldon is a novelist, composer, playwright and



performer. Formerly the West Coast bureau chief for *Byte Magazine*, his writing has appeared in publications ranging from *Acoustic Guitar* to *Yankee Magazine*. He writes music for children and adults and created the bestselling *Sing Along and Learn*series published by Scholastic. His writings appear under his own name, and also as suspense novelist Michael Manley and Yankee humorist Fred Marple.

Michael Manley is the pen name of the late Stanley Michael Miastkowski and

Kenneth Manley Sheldon. Stan was a search and rescue worker who participated in dozens of rescue and recovery operations, including operations following the September 11 attacks in New York. He was a broadcast and print journalist for nearly 35 years, including stints as a columnist for *Esquire*, *PC World* and *Byte Magazine*. Stan passed away in 2009.



April 18 at the Peterborough Library: Brian Evans-Jones is a poet and teacher who has lived

in South Berwick since 2014. He was born in Britain, where he was Poet Laureate of the Hampshire region for 2012-13. In 2017, he won the

Maureen Egen Writers Exchange Award from Poets & Writers in

New York City. His poems have appeared in competitions, magazines, and art events in America and the United Kingdom, and he has taught poetry in schools across Maine and New Hampshire, as well as in England. He publishes free poetry learning resources at The Poetry Place.



May 16 at the Peterborough Library: Member Read-Around. Please come, share your writing, and try to keep your selection to ten minutes so everyone will have a chance to share!

June 20 at the Peterborough Library: Lorraine Ash's journalistic life led her to the White



House, homeless shelters, disaster zones, psychiatric wards, forests, caves, and castles. Ash has interviewed astronauts, Olympians, economic gurus, politicians, doctors, artists and, perhaps most importantly, ordinary people. Her articles, which won twenty-six writing awards over the years, appeared in newspapers nationwide, including *USA Today*. A love of

American history led to penning three historical plays about American presidents—

Tyler, Monroe, and Jackson—published by The History Project. Ash had produced numerous short stories and essays for literary journals and anthologies. These include Tiferet, Cairn, Journeys, Ducts, Recovering the Self: A Journal of Hope and Healing, and Steeped in the World of Tea. In midlife a significant event changed Ash: her daughter, her only child, was stillborn in June 1999. Suddenly she understood the importance of telling stories from the inside out. Subsequently, she wrote Life Touches Life: A Mother's Story of Stillbirth and Healing (NewSage Press), a memoir that has reached stillbirth mothers in the United States, the Middle East, Australia, Europe, China, Canada, and Mexico.



Next came the spiritual midlife memoir, *Self and Soul: On Creating a Meaningful Life* (Cape House Books). Ash has worked one-on-one with more than sixty writers to either ghostwrite, edit, or coach their book manuscripts into existence. Her mission is to facilitate quality storytelling.
