The Monadnock Writers' Group will hold its annual 3-Minute Fiction Contest on October 25th at 10:00 am at the Mariposa Museum in Peterborough. This event has been one of the highlights of the MWG program both in challenging writers and in entertaining audience members. Contestants will read a selection of their own writing, to be judged by a panel of experienced, well-published writers. Readings will be timed and points deducted for excess time over the three minutes. There is no charge to participate, and the public is welcome to join as contestants or supporters. The winner will be invited to the New Hampshire finals, which will be held on November 8th at Southern New Hampshire University, where a top prize of \$250 will be awarded.

# 2025 FALL MEETING & SPEAKER SCHEDULE



October 18: David Moloney is the author of *Barker House*, a novel that revolves around a number of correctional officers at a fictional county jail in New Hampshire. His short stories and essays have also appeared in *Guernica*, *The Yale Review*, *AGNI*, *Joyland*, *The Common*, and elsewhere. He's a graduate of the University of Massachusetts Lowell and earned his master's at the Mountainview MFA (SNHU), where he was

awarded the Lynn Safford Memorial Prize for Outstanding Thesis. He now teaches and coordinates the undergraduate creative writing program at Southern New Hampshire University.

November 15: Richard Adams Carey has pursued seal and walrus with Yupik Eskimo hunters; fished for lobster, shrimp, and cod off Cape Cod in the winter; ridden shotgun with Russian fisheries police in pursuit of sturgeon poachers; and reconstructed—on a moment-by-moment basis—the events of a mass shooting in a small New England town. He is the prize-winning author of four books of literary nonfiction. His short fiction, essays, and reviews have appeared in such places as the Alaska Quarterly Review, Hunger Mountain, the Beloit Fiction Journal, Harvard Magazine, the Massachusetts Review, Yankee Magazine, and the Wall Street Journal. He is a former president of the New Hampshire Writers' Project, and he has taught graduate-level fiction and nonfiction at Southern New Hampshire University. His work-in-progress, a natural and social history of seals, will be published in 2027.

### **OPEN SUBMISSIONS**

**Graywolf Press is accepting submissions for Poetry**. Graywolf Press partners with the Academy of American Poets and Cave Canem to publish and promote the work of new and emerging writers.

Walt Whitman Award

The Walt Whitman Award is a \$5,000 first book publication prize given to an American poet. In addition to publication and promotion by Graywolf Press, the winner receives an all-expenses-paid six-week residency at the Civitella Ranieri Center in Umbria, Italy, and a trip to New York City to attend the American Poets Prizes ceremony. The Academy of American Poets purchases

### Cave Canem Poetry Prize

Graywolf Press is one of the publishers of the Cave Canem Poetry Prize, a first book award dedicated to the discovery of exceptional manuscripts by African American poets. Graywolf publishes every third winner of the prize. More information is available on the <u>Cave</u> Canem website.

For fiction and nonfiction manuscripts, agented submission is required.

Alice James Books is accepting submissions of poetry manuscripts. Alice James Books will consider submissions of poetry manuscripts to the 2026 Alice James Award postmarked through October 17th, 2025. The Alice James Award welcomes submissions from emerging as well as established poets. Entrants must reside in the United States.

The winner of the 2026 award will receive \$2000, book publication, promotion, and distribution via Consortium Book Sales and Distribution. In addition to the winning manuscript, one or more additional manuscripts may be chosen for publication as the Editor's Choice.

### **Guidelines for Manuscript Submission:**

- AI-generated and AI-assisted work is strictly prohibited. Those interested in
  submitting to the AJA may use AI to research and inspire revision to existing poems but
  submitted collections as a whole, and every element of the poems within, must have been
  originally imagined and created by the author alone; in cases where lines or phrases were
  inspired by or pay homage to other resources, proper attribution is required. All
  manuscripts proven to have benefited from AI assistance will be immediately
  disqualified.
- Screening for the Alice James Award is blind. No contact information may appear within your manuscript, including within the filename, if electronically submitted. Do not include any preambles, bios, author's notes, or acknowledgments within your submitted manuscript. Notes on the poems are permitted.
- Hard copy submissions: send one copy of your manuscript with two title pages (one that includes just the title of your manuscript, the second the title and your contact information [your name, address, phone number, e-mail address, and an optional biographical note]). Use only binder clips. No staples, folders, or printer-bound copies.
- Manuscripts may be submitted online or by regular mail. Mail hard copy entries to: Alice James Books, Alice James Award, Auburn Hall, 60 Pineland Drive, Suite 206, New Gloucester, ME 04260. Online submissions are open until 11:59 PM EST on the deadline.
- Manuscripts must have a numbered table of contents, typed in no smaller than 12-point font, paginated, and 48 100 pages (single-spaced) in length. We accept double-sided manuscripts.

- Decorative illustrations, photographs, or images should not be included; hybrid poems are permitted. Images that identify the author must be redacted.
- Individual poems from the manuscript may have been previously published in magazines, anthologies, or chapbooks of less than 25 pages, but the collection, as a whole, must be unpublished.
- Translations and self-published books are not eligible.
- No multi-authored collections, please.
- MANUSCRIPTS CANNOT BE RETURNED. Please do not send us your only copy.
- Entry fee for the Alice James Award is \$30 for online and hardcopy submissions. Checks or money orders for hardcopy submissions should be made payable to Alice James Books.
- Winners will be announced in February/March 2026.

### **Checklist for entry:**

- **Electronic:** One (1) PDF or .docx copy of manuscript (NO CONTACT INFORMATION WITHIN MANUSCRIPT).
- **Hardcopy:** Two (2) copies of title page (one page that shows only the title, the second which shows the title and your contact information) and One (1) printed copy of manuscript enclosed (NO CONTACT INFORMATION WITHIN MANUSCRIPT). If you wish acknowledgment of the receipt of your manuscript, include a stamped addressed postcard. For notification of winners, include a business-sized SASE.

# **CONTESTS**

**Red Hen Press invites submission of poetry collections.** Established in 1998, in honor of the poet Benjamin Saltman (1927–1999), this award is for a previously unpublished (including self-published works) original collection of poetry. Awarded collection is selected through an annual competition which is open to all poets. This year's final judge will be **Brenda Cárdenas.** *Deadline: October 31, 2025.* Award is \$3,000 and publication of the awarded manuscript by Red Hen Press. Entry fee is \$25.00. 48 page minimum, 96 page maximum. (sized on 8.5"x11" sheet, 1" margin, 12 pt. Times New Roman).

**New Women's Voices Chapbook Competition.** A prize of \$1,500, royalty contract, and publication by Finishing Line Press is given annually to the winner for a poetry chapbook by a writer who identifies as a woman and has not yet published a full-length collection. We will select a winner and 10 finalists to be included in the New Women's Voices chapbook series. Submit a manuscript of 16 to 30 pages of poetry plus bio, title page, and acknowledgments with a \$20 entry fee by October 15, 2025. We do allow hybrid manuscripts in addition to traditional poetry manuscripts: prose poetry or formal verse.

We do allow color or black/white art to be included with the manuscript. Please follow page count guidelines. One page of art is equal to one page of poetry. The Hope Prize Global Writers' Prize. There are no geographical restrictions. The Hope Prize is an international competition, open to writers from anywhere in the world. The deadline for receipt of entries is 11:59pm EST on 31 October 2025. You don't need a publishing history or formal training. You just need a compelling story and the skill to tell it well. We believe great writing is rooted in curiosity, sharp observation and literary instinct, not credentials. Whether this is your first submission or your fiftieth, we're excited to read work that moves us, challenges us and stays with us. We welcome short stories that are either fiction or narrative nonfiction. Fiction can be entirely imagined, while nonfiction may draw from real life, including memoir, as long as it's crafted with a strong narrative arc and emotional resonance. Submissions must not have been widely published before — this includes online and in print media. *The Madison Review* Fiction. Deadline November 2, 2025. We accept previously unpublished fiction, typed. Submissions should be double-spaced, with standard 1" margins. Submissions are to be in 12-point, standard font with page numbers. Submissions should be no longer than 30 pages. Cover letters are to be kept to a 250-word maximum. Black Fox Literary Magazine Fiction, Flash Fiction, Nonfiction, Poetry. Thank you for your interest in Black Fox! Black Fox Literary Magazine is an international print and online biannual publication featuring quality fiction of all styles and genres, poetry, and creative nonfiction. We publish one summer issue and one winter issue each year. *Parley Lit* Prose and Poetry. Deadline 12/1/2025. Use this category for fully created previously unpublished written poetry or prose (creative nonfiction, fiction, or hybrid work). Your projects should not appear, in full, on any other platform (YouTube, Spotify, other lit magazines, your published book, your personal website or blog). You must attach the original file as a doc, docx, or pdf. Do not send a link to a file. Spectacle Open Call Full Manuscripts for Poetry. This is a non-contest open call for poetry manuscripts. We're accepting full-length manuscripts (roughly between 50 and 120 pages) to consider for publication in 2026. The deadline is December 31st, 2025. The open category will run on a periodic basis. Typically, when one period ends another will open consecutively or soon thereafter. There are no restrictions on who can submit or what kind of poetry--in English, or in translation into English--can be submitted, regardless of publication history or style. Collaborative manuscripts are also welcome. Current and former editors and interns of Action, Spectacle are not eligible. Individual poems in the manuscript may have been published previously in a chapbook, magazines, journals or anthologies, but the work as a whole must be unpublished. This is not a contest. Please include a cover page with your title, name, email address, phone number, and physical address. Manuscripts are not read blind. Also, include a table of contents. If applicable, please include an acknowledgments page, listing any previous
