RECENT MEETING

On November 15, MWG welcomed Richard Adams Carey at the Peterborough Library.

Carey shared with members of the Monadnock Writers Group his fascinating writing and publishing journey, which included pursuit of seal and walrus with Yupik Eskimo hunters; fishing for lobster, shrimp, and cod off Cape Cod in the winter; riding shotgun with Russian fisheries police in pursuit of sturgeon poachers; and reconstructing—on a moment-by-moment basis—the events of a mass shooting in a small New England town. Carey is the prizewinning author of four books of literary nonfiction. His short fiction,

essays, and reviews have appeared in such places as the *Alaska Ouarterly Review, Hunger*



Mountain, the Beloit Fiction
Journal, Harvard Magazine, the
Massachusetts Review, Yankee
Magazine, and the Wall Street
Journal. He is a former president
of the New Hampshire Writers'
Project, and he has taught
graduate-level fiction and
nonfiction at Southern New
Hampshire University. His workin-progress, a natural and social
history of seals, will be published
in 2027.

January 17 at the Peterborough Library: Betsy Small. Revisiting journals and photos from



her Peace Corps days between 1984 and 1987 inspired Betsy Small's memoir *Before Before: A Story of Discovery and Loss in Sierra Leone*. In 1988, Small worked for the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C. and subsequently traveled to Africa to support a farming cooperative in Ghana. During her visit, Small hoped to visit with dear friends in Sierra Leone. Instead, the government of Ghana mistakenly accused her of belonging to a subversive group, which led to her arrest, detention, and deportation. Kirkus Reviews

called Small's *Before Before* "A powerful commentary and memoir that challenge Western narratives of Sierra Leone."

February 21 at the Peterborough Library: Sebastian Lockwood. Storyteller and podcaster Sebastian Lockwood tells the great epics: Gilgamesh, Odysseus, Caesar, Beowulf and Monkey. His studies in Classics and Anthropology at Boston University and Cambridge University in the UK laid the foundation for bringing these great tales into performance. Lockwood's

performances are designed to take complex texts and make them accessible and exciting for audiences from 5 to 95. Lockwood has tutored and taught classes in higher education for 25 years. Lockwood launched two storytelling podcasts in 2022: Blowing Up Stumps- tales from New and Old England (with Maine storyteller Matt Gile), and Monkey- the Journey to the West. He now concentrates on performance, podcasting, workshops, and audiobook narration. Lockwood lives under Crotched Mountain in a 1792 house with his wife, jazz singer and LUX Lifestyle founder, Nanette Perrotte.



March 21 at the Peterborough Library: Ken Sheldon is a novelist, composer, playwright and

performer. Formerly the West Coast bureau chief for *Byte Magazine*, his writing has appeared in publications ranging from *Acoustic Guitar* to *Yankee Magazine*. He writes music for children and adults and created the bestselling *Sing Along and Learn* series published by Scholastic. His writings appear under his own name, and also as suspense novelist Michael Manley and Yankee humorist <u>Fred Marple</u>.

Michael Manley is the pen name of the late Stanley Michael Miastkowski and

Kenneth Manley Sheldon. Stan was a search and rescue worker who participated in dozens of rescue and recovery operations, including operations following the September 11 attacks in New York. He was a broadcast and print journalist for nearly 35 years, including stints as a columnist for *Esquire*, *PC World* and *Byte Magazine*. Stan passed away in 2009.



April 18 at the Peterborough Library: Brian Evans-Jones is a poet and teacher who has lived in South Berwick since 2014. He was born in Britain, where he was Poet

Laureate of the Hampshire region for 2012-13. In 2017, he won the

Maureen Egen Writers Exchange Award from Poets & Writers in

New York City. His poems have appeared in competitions, magazines, and art events in America and the United Kingdom, and he has taught poetry in schools across Maine and New Hampshire, as well as in England. He publishes free poetry learning

resources at The Poetry Place.

May 16 at the Peterborough Library: Member Read-Around. Please come, share your writing, and try to keep your selection to ten minutes so everyone will have a chance to share!

June 20 at the Peterborough Library: Lorraine Ash's journalistic life led her to the White



House, homeless shelters, disaster zones, psychiatric wards, forests, caves, and castles. Ash has interviewed astronauts, Olympians, economic gurus, politicians, doctors, artists and, perhaps most importantly, ordinary people. Her articles, which won twenty-six writing awards over the years, appeared in newspapers nationwide, including *USA Today*. A love of

American history led to penning three historical plays about American presidents—

Tyler, Monroe, and Jackson—published by The History Project. Ash had produced numerous short stories and essays for literary journals and anthologies. These include Tiferet, Cairn, Journeys, Ducts, Recovering the Self: A Journal of Hope and Healing, and Steeped in the World of Tea. In midlife a significant event changed Ash: her daughter, her only child, was stillborn in June 1999. Suddenly she understood the importance of telling stories from the inside out. Subsequently, she wrote Life Touches Life: A Mother's Story of Stillbirth and Healing (NewSage Press), a memoir that has reached stillbirth mothers in the United States, the Middle East, Australia, Europe, China, Canada, and Mexico.



Next came the spiritual midlife memoir, *Self and Soul: On Creating a Meaningful Life* (Cape House Books). Ash has worked one-on-one with more than sixty writers to either ghostwrite, edit, or coach their book manuscripts into existence. Her mission is to facilitate quality storytelling.

Spectacle Open Call Full Manuscripts for Poetry. This is a non-contest open call for poetry manuscripts. We're accepting full-length manuscripts (roughly between 50 and 120 pages) to consider for publication in 2026. The deadline is December 31st, 2025. The open category will run on a periodic basis. Typically, when one period ends another will open consecutively or soon thereafter. There are no restrictions on who can submit or what kind of poetry--in English, or in translation into English--can be submitted, regardless of publication history or style. Collaborative manuscripts are also welcome. Current and former editors and interns of Action, Spectacle are not eligible. Individual poems in the manuscript may have been published previously in a chapbook, magazines, journals or anthologies, but the work as a whole must be unpublished. This is not a contest. Please include a cover page with your title, name, email address, phone number, and physical address. Manuscripts are not read blind. Also, include a table of contents.
